
Infrastructure/Transport:

- Approximately 100km to the northern most tip of New Zealand, Cape Reinga. A very popular tourist destination with its famous lighthouse on the peninsula considered as the separation marker between the 2 seas - Tasman Sea to the west and the Pacific Ocean to the east.
